
It gives me great pleasure to welcome everyone to the 9th annual Irish Military Seminar at the Riverbank Arts Centre, Newbridge.

#### 19.30 Presentation by Ray Lane: 'Only a soldier knows'

Ray Lane's memoir explores the nature of warfare, duty and the courage and mental strength it takes to be the person who overrides every natural human instinct and walks towards an improvised explosive device. Lt. Colonel (retired) Ray Lane has over thirty years of experience in counter terrorism from both an operational perspective and product developer. He has served with EU/UN and NATO in Bosnia-Herzegovina, Lebanon, and Afghanistan. Ray has given personal and expert evidence to the International War Crimes Tribunal on the former Yugoslavia. Stephen is currently writing a compendium of Irish rebellions from the Anglo-Norman conquest to the Late Modern period.




Clodagh Finn is author of Through Her Eyes: A History of Ireland in 21 Women and A Time to Risk All, a biography of Mary Elmes, the 'Irish Oskar Schindler'. In 2022, she collaborated with the Lord Mayor of Dublin, Alison Gilliland, to write Her Keys to the City, highlighting the overlooked contributions of eighty women who shaped Dublin. Clodagh writes 'An Irishwoman's Diary' in the Irish Examiner.

John Morgan is a lawyer who has a longstanding interest in the history of World War II, particularly in relation to Allied Resistance and Escape Lines. John is a Trustee of the Escape Lines Memorial Society (UK) and co-founder of the Basque Pyrenees Freedom Trails' Association (Basque Country/Spain).

Gerard Shannon is a historian of the early 20th century Irish revolutionary period. In 2023, his book *Liam Lynch: To Declare a Republic* – a biography of the IRA Chief of Staff during the Civil War – was released to critical acclaim. He is currently writing a biography of Irish republican leader Rory O'Connor for release in spring 2026.



Michael B. Barry is the author of many books, including best-selling Victorian Dublin Recorded, a trilogy of books on the Irish Revolution period and the critically acclaimed An illustrated history of the Irish Revolution 1916-1923.

John O'Byrne is a professional photographer and colouriser. Over the last decade he has specialised in colourising military scenes from the early 20th century. John has collaborated with Michael B. Barry on three bestselling books The Irish Civil War in Colour; A Nation is Born. Ireland in Colour 1923-1938 and The Emergency in Colour. Ireland in Wartime.

### 9.40-10.20: The Irish Military in France, 1690-1815. Stephen McGarry

Around 50,000 Irishmen served in the armies of France, Spain and Austria from 1690 until the disbandment of the Irish Brigade in the Spanish Service in 1818. The Irish Brigade in the French Service gained a reputation as crack troops and served France with distinction for one hundred years. They were followed by Napoleon's Irish Legion, a new unit raised for an anticipated invasion of Ireland.

Rory O'Connor had several key roles in the revolutionary movement, but it was his opposition to the Anglo-Irish Treaty that brought him to public prominence and began his path to civil war, eventual execution and the endurance of his memory within Irish republican commemoration.
